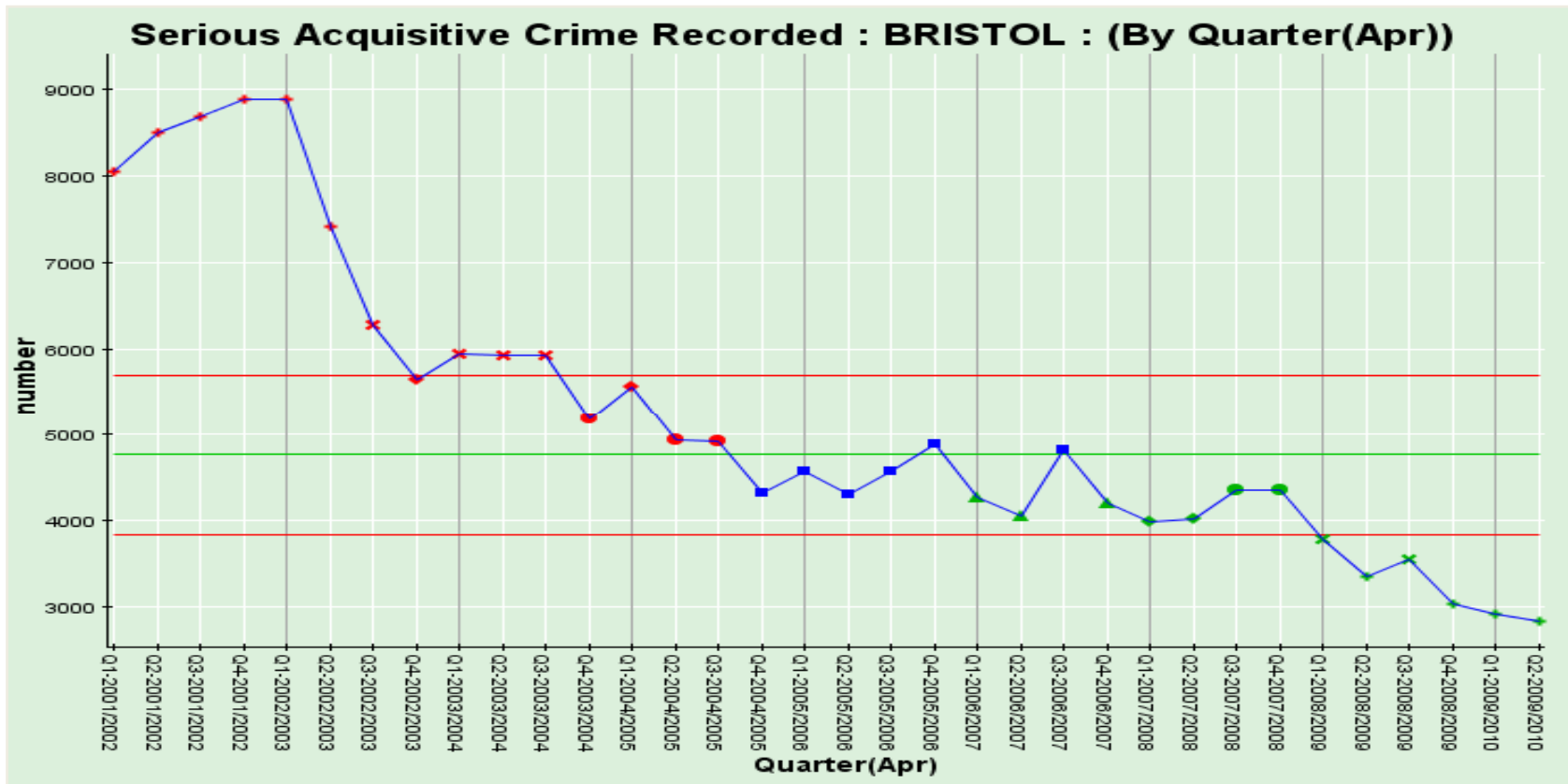

Why do we need IOM?

- Build upon successes in Prolific Offender and Drug Intervention Programmes
- Further gains require a step-change in our approach to crime and criminals.
- An overarching and dynamic method of ensuring that resource follows risk

Our Vision

- Reduce crime overall particularly crime causing our communities most harm (serious acquisitive)
Target 25% in 2 years.
- Select and manage the 1000 offenders having the most harmful impact in Bristol.
- Creation of a co-located multi-agency team.
- Assessing and addressing individual needs using the pathways approach.

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Complex needs: structured multi modal approach

- Prolific acquisitive criminals are among the most socially excluded groups in the community.
- They require selected and **sequenced** interventions on the pathways.
- One plan
- Work with specialist women's provision Eden House

Operational Principles

- Intelligent use of intelligence.
- The offer you should not refuse.

Acceptance Contract – Part

- I understand that in order to stop me committing further crimes the police, probation and prison services will:
- Work together to help me make changes in my life
- Share information they have about me to stop me committing more crimes
- Ensure that if I do commit more crimes I will be quickly arrested and recalled to prison if I am on conditional release, and/or brought before a court.

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RAG Status

- All managed offenders are graded:
- **Red** - Offending in the community
- **Amber** - Incomplete intelligence picture
- **Green** - Intelligence suggests not offending
- **Blue** - In custody

Managing Offenders

- Fortnightly multi-agency IOMU tasking meeting
- Manages problematic 'red' offenders in the community & those about to leave custody
- Draws on PPO tactical menu
- Supportive/coercive interventions depending on offender needs
- Day-to-day management by Offender Managers using case conference approach

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The story so far.....

- All staff in place from all CJ agencies
- All resources mainstreamed from the outset
- Full integration with PPOs
- Strengthening pathway development and delivery
- Access to rapid prescribing agreed for all IOMU clients
- Protocol agreed with YOT for managing young offenders & DYO's

What Next for 2009/10

- Need to identify new accommodation
- Build caseload to 500
- Further develop offender management/case conference model
- Further integration with CJIT
- Implementation of Performance Management Framework
- Consider new crime categories suitable for this approach

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And beyond.....

- Build caseload to 1000 (by April 2011) and workforce to support this
- Establish fully integrated pathway support within IOMU
- Evaluate effectiveness of the scheme
- Establish as “ normal way” of doing business
